

The pass line bet is a bet that the shooter (the person rolling the dice) will roll a 7 or 11 on the come-out roll (the first roll of the dice). If the shooter rolls a 7 or 11, the pass line bet wins. If the shooter rolls a 2, 3, or 12, the pass line bet loses. If the shooter rolls any other number, the point is established and the shooter continues to roll the dice until they either roll the point number or a 7.



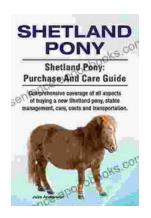


