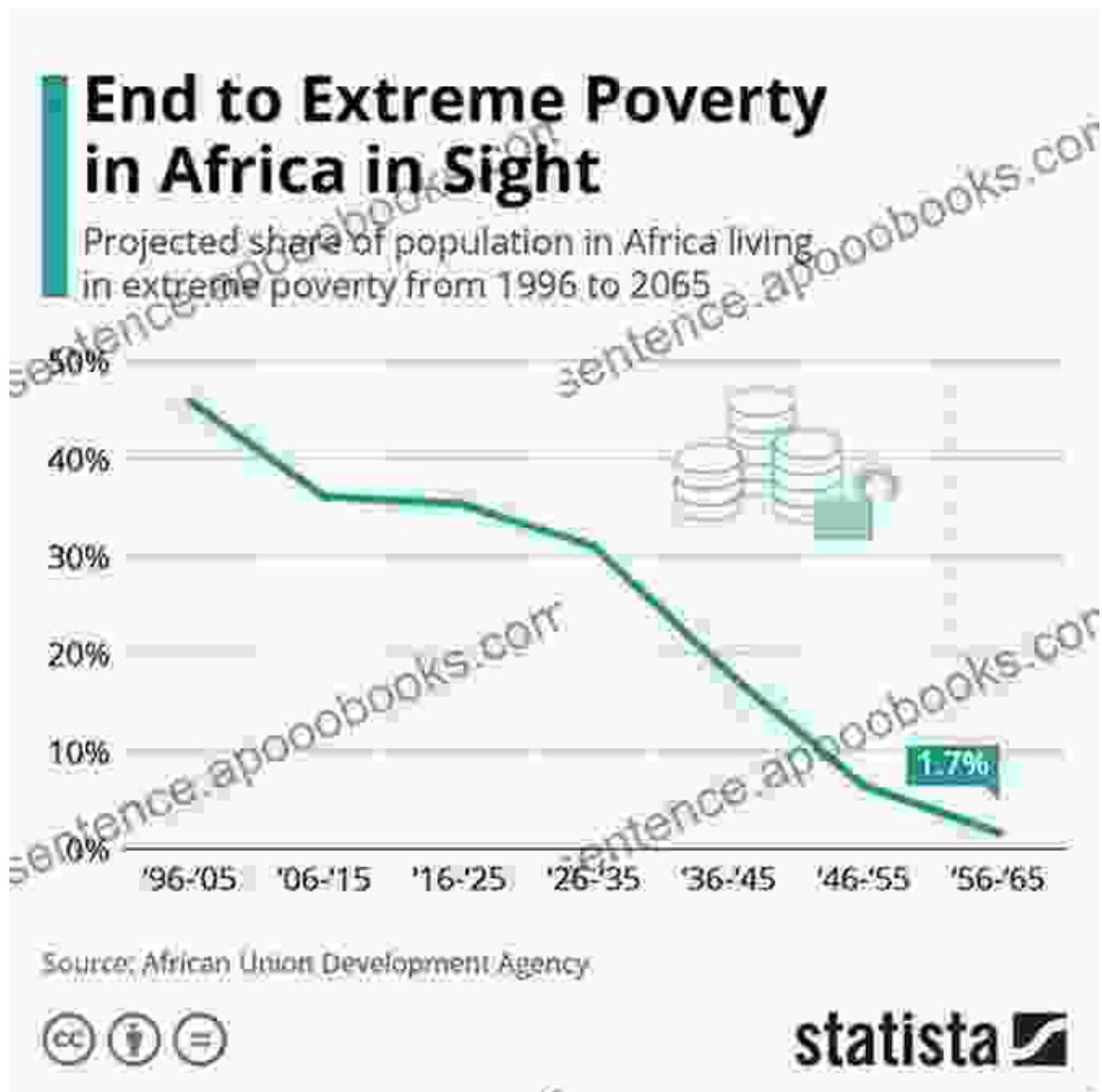

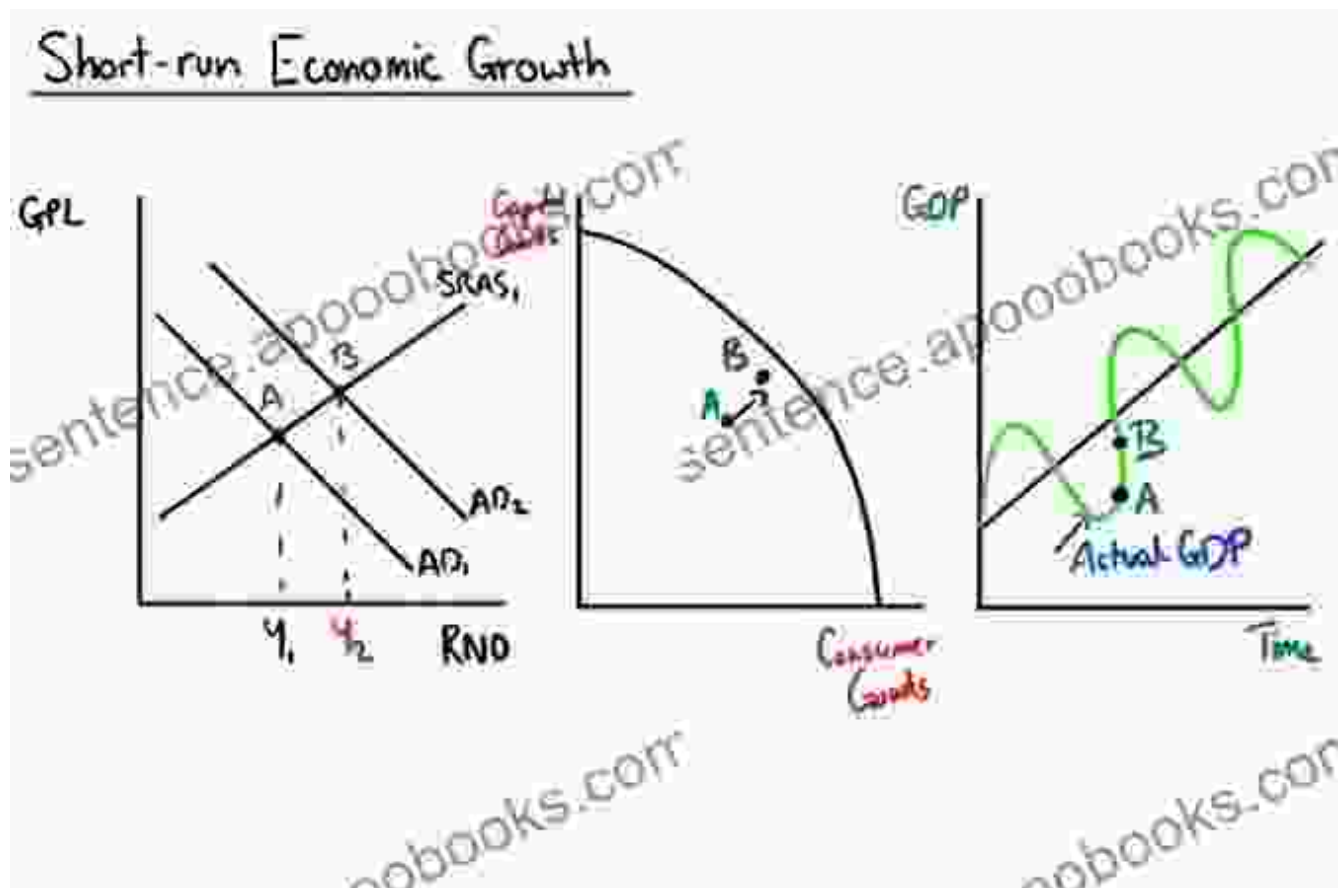

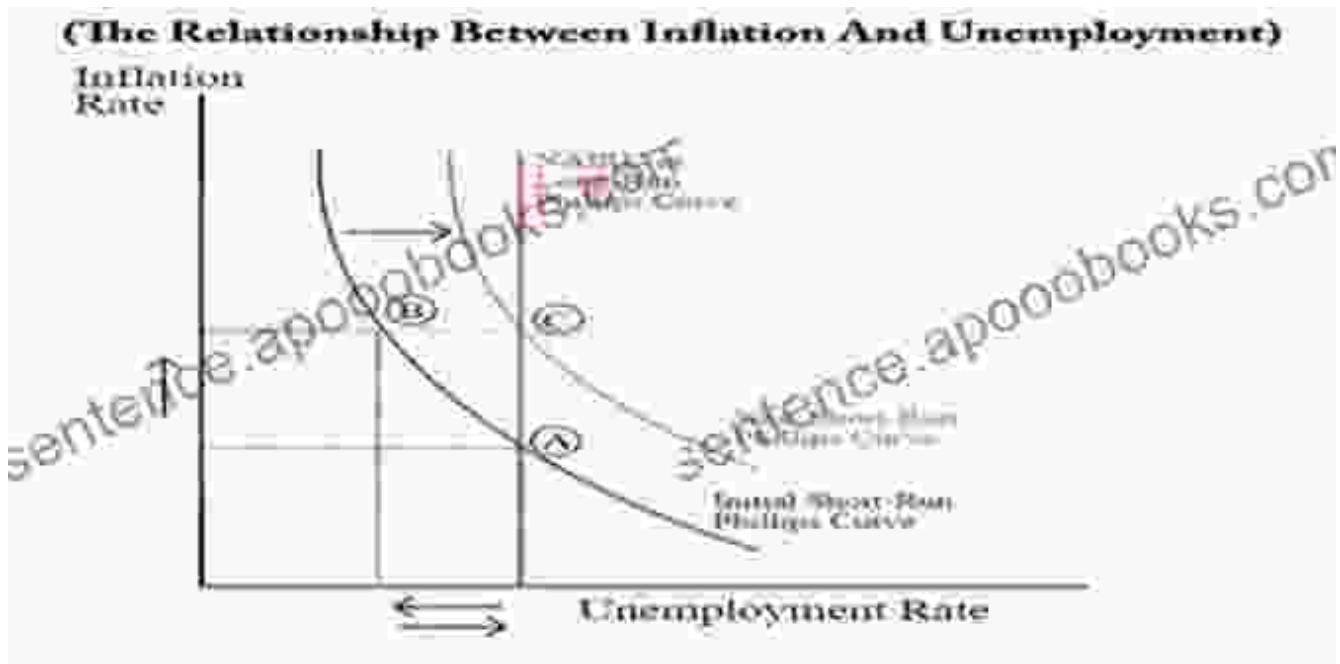
## Since 2000, U.S. women's labor force participation has declined

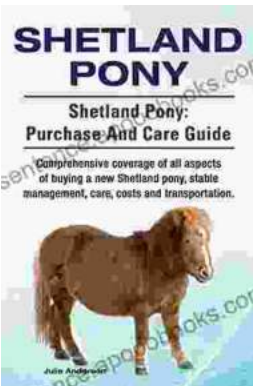

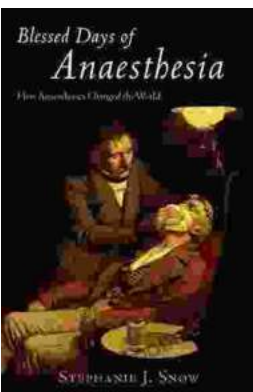
